When Taraji P. Henson signed on for the lead role, she met with the real-life Katherine Johnson, who was 98 years old, to discuss the character she was about to portray. Henson learned that Johnson had graduated from high school at age 14 and from college at age 18. Even at such an old age, she was still as lucid as anyone years younger.

At age 98, Katherine Johnson was the only survivor of the 'Hidden Figures' to see her achievements depicted on film. In November 2015, President Barack Obama awarded her a Presidential Medal of Freedom for her work at NASA, and she was further honored the following year when a new \$30m, 40,000-square-foot NASA building was named the Katherine G Johnson Computational Research Facility.
