About the film:

After the death of Princess Diana, Queen Elizabeth II struggles with her reaction to a sequence of events nobody could have predicted.

Diana the 'People's Princess' has died in a car accident in Paris. The Queen and her family decide that for the best, they should remain hidden behind the closed doors of Balmoral Castle. As far as the Queen is concerned, Diana's death is a private matter given that she was no longer an "HRH". This also puts pressure on newly elected Prime Minister Tony Blair. Trivia about the Film:

Helen Mirren's performance received a five-minute standing ovation at the film's premiere at the Venice Film Festival. Helen Mirren was praised by Queen Elizabeth herself and invited for dinner at Buckingham Palace.

10 Downing Street is portrayed as slightly dilapidated, poorly decorated, and middleclass. This is supposedly how the residence actually is, and the real Cherie Blair was supposedly appalled when she first saw where the family would be living.

The film was the only Best Picture Oscar nominee that year to be also nominated for Best Costume Design.

The jewellery Helen Mirren wears is based on actual jewels owned by Elizabeth II. Some pieces shown include: her trademark two or three strands of pearls, Queen Victoria's bow brooch (at Diana's funeral), and Queen Mary's button earrings (the large pearl earrings each topped by a tiny diamond).

The film grossed around 125 million US\$ of revenue worldwide.
